Dear Prospective Transfer Student

Congratulations on your interest in furthering your studies at Johnson & Wales, America's Career University.® By joining us, you'll receive the education, skills and professional development that have helped thousands of J&W grads start successful careers within 60 days of graduation for over 20 years.

We've developed this guide to help simplify the transfer process from the Colorado Community College System (CCCS) to Johnson & Wales (J&W).

In it, you will find a list of CCCS courses and their equivalent here at J&W. In addition, we have highlighted the curricula for some of our most popular majors for transfer students: Accounting, Criminal Justice, Marketing, Management and Financial Services Management.

Because transfer credit is evaluated on an individual basis, and curriculum changes occur each year, the provided list is a guide only and is not intended as a guaranteed study plan. Johnson & Wales University course catalogs will be available which outline current curricula and course offerings. Students covered under this agreement should be able to complete their bachelor's program in two calendar years. Students should always discuss their individual study plans soon after their arrival at Johnson & Wales University. Other general studies courses not listed will be evaluated on a course-by-course basis. It is important for students to discuss transfer credits and course availability with an admissions representative.

Students from the Colorado Community College System will have the opportunity to transfer to our campuses in Denver, Colorado; Providence, Rhode Island; Charlotte, North Carolina or North Miami, Florida. Students may visit our website at www.jwu.edu/sas to review the Johnson & Wales catalog. Please refer to the catalog for specific majors offered at various campuses.

Admissions Requirements

Johnson & Wales University seeks students who have a true desire for practical career preparation in their chosen field and who have the ability to achieve academic success. Graduation from high school or equivalent education as certified by the state department of education is required for undergraduate admission. Due to the technical standards and requirements essential to certain technical programs at the University, applicants with special needs or physical limitations should discuss their needs with the University prior to enrolling. Copies of the technical standards applicable to various programs are available.

Transfer students are eligible to enroll in any Johnson & Wales major. Transfer credit evaluations are based on previous college work as it relates to the intended field of study.

Acceptances are made on a rolling basis as an application becomes complete. Upon receiving notice of your acceptance, you are required to forward to the University a \$300 tuition reservation deposit, which is credited to your initial billing and is nonrefundable.

Applying for Admission

Students may apply for admission to Johnson & Wales at no cost. A free admission application is enclosed with this guide. To obtain additional applications, photocopy the one enclosed or call the University at (303) 256-9300 or 1-877-JWU-DENVER (598-3368). Students may apply online at www.jwu.edu/denver.

Applications should be completed in full and sent to the Admissions Office, Johnson & Wales University, 7150 Montview Blvd., Denver, CO 80220. There is no deadline for submitting applications, but you are advised to apply as early as possible before your intended date of enrollment to ensure full consideration.

Please be sure to have your official high school and college transcripts forwarded to Johnson & Wales. We cannot make a decision on your application until all documentation is received.

J&W's Transfer Credit Policy

Transfer students are eligible to enroll in any Johnson & Wales major. Transfer credit evaluations are based on previous college work as it relates to the intended field of study at Johnson & Wales.

Along with their official high school transcripts, transfer candidates must submit official college transcripts from all colleges previously attended prior to enrolling at Johnson & Wales. Credit is usually granted for courses completed with a grade of "C" or better (numeric value of 2.0) at another accredited institution. Grades of "Pass" are also acceptable for transfer if credit was awarded (and the "P" carries a numeric value of at least 2.0). Transfer credit is not awarded for remedial, CEU's or fundamental coursework.

Transfer equivalents discussed in this manual are based on Johnson & Wales University's 2007-2008 catalog. You must select a major to ensure proper awarding of transfer credit. Johnson & Wales will evaluate your transcripts course-by-course to ensure you are granted maximum allowable credit. The credit hours you received for a course must match that offered at Johnson & Wales.

The transfer advising plans enclosed do not necessarily guarantee all credit listed. They are provided as a guide for you to determine possible transfer credit. Course requirements and curriculum may change at any time without notice. All transfer candidates must speak with a Johnson & Wales admissions officer to review their transfer credit allowance.

Prior Learning Assessment

(Portfolio Development, Departmental Challenge Examinations and CLEP Examinations)
All matriculating Johnson & Wales students are eligible to apply for participation and earn credit in the Standardized Testing and Prior Learning programs. By successfully completing the following options offered, students can earn course credit for previous academic and/or prior learning experience.

Portfolio Assessment (for credit, with fees)

Students may earn credits for the knowledge or skills they have mastered outside the classroom through volunteer work, employment, travel programs, organizations or other comparable sources. To apply for Portfolio Assessment, students must first meet the University's residency requirements and complete the Portfolio Development non-credit seminar.

Challenge Examinations (for credit, with fees)

Departmental exams may be taken for specifically designated courses within a department. The academic department determines policy as it relates to the testing options for each course in the department. Applications may be obtained from Student Academic Services.

CLEP Examinations (for credit, with fees)

The College-Level Examination Program of the College Board tests are widely accepted national examinations in various subjects and are treated as transfer credits. The American Council on Education's recommended score is required to earn credit. Applications may be obtained from Student Academic Services.

Please consult the Standardized Testing and Prior Learning Assessment brochure (available from Student Academic Services) for detailed policies on the above programs as well as required fees, annual seminar dates, examination dates and application deadlines.

Accounting

J&W's College of Business offers two- and four-year Accounting degree programs. The Bachelor of Science degree program in Accounting includes extensive specialized accounting courses as well as related business subjects and general studies. The four-year program is designed to prepare you for entry into a variety of challenging positions with public accounting firms, as well as private, governmental and nonprofit organizations. A position might be that of staff accountant in a public accounting firm, or in the finance, tax or cost department of another organization.

Students receive hands-on experience by performing accounting functions for various University operations. Students participating in the Accounting practicum may graduate with experience in accounting, payroll, accounts payable, financial reporting and internal audit. Students may also apply for co-op in place of one term of classroom studies.

Financing Your Education

To assist you in meeting your educational expenses, Johnson & Wales University offers several types of financial assistance — scholarships and grants, low-interest loans and employment opportunities. In many cases, qualified students receive a financial aid package which includes all three types of financial aid.

To be considered for financial assistance, complete all the documentation listed below and submit all required documentation as soon as possible after January 1. Students must reapply for financial aid each year. Johnson & Wales University holds all information in strict confidence.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid is available from the University's Student Financial Services Office within the Student Academic Services Department. This form must be completed and forwarded as soon as possible after January 1 to the Federal Processor. Your application for financial assistance is then processed and sent to the Student Financial Services Office at the University. You may also complete the FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Transfer students must submit a financial aid transcript to the Student Financial Services Office within the Student Academic Services Department from every school they have attended beyond high school. The financial aid transcript must be completed even if the student did not receive aid from other school(s) attended. Please contact the financial aid office at your other school(s) and request that they forward an official financial aid transcript to J&W's Student Financial Services Office.

Scholarships

Listed below are some scholarships available to transfer students. For a complete listing, consult the Johnson & Wales University Catalog.

Transfer Scholarship

Transfer scholarships are awarded to students who plan to continue their education at Johnson & Wales in associate or bachelor's degree programs. Students who have completed a minimum of 30 semester hours at another institution and have maintained a minimum 3.0 cumulative average are eligible to receive awards in amounts ranging up to \$5,000.

Phi Theta Kappa/Alpha Beta Gamma

The University annually recognizes outstanding transfer students who are members of Phi Theta Kappa and Alpha Beta Gamma by awarding transfer scholarships in the amounts ranging up to \$10,000. Awards are based on membership, recommendation from chapter advisor, and transcripts. The scholarship application is the admissions application.

National Student Organizations

Students who participated in DECA/Delta Epsilon Chi, FBLA/Phi Beta Lambda, FHA, The National FFA, BPA, TSA, Junior Achievement, and SkillsUSA at the high school or college level may be eligible for scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to full tuition. In addition, each organization offers one full tuition award per year. Awards are based upon club participation, advisor recommendation, and high school or college academic performance.
